DUKE IN THE PICTURE

DEMS90/4-4:

Moulé question re "MY OLD FLAME" and "BELLE OF THE NINETIES": The unedited original pre-recording of "My Old Flame" has yet to be released. Steven Lasker holds a test of Victor mx PBS 79181-1, which was made from the pre-recordings. It has the waltz-time ending that was part of the original soundtrack pre-recording (and was replaced on the soundtrack with a different, separately recorded waltz-time ending), according to the original Paramount files.

This ending is missing from all of the subsequent releases that were made from that RCA master, be they the 78s (Cosmopolitan; Biltmore); or the French RCA LPs, Decca DL 79176; MCA MCG 3517.

CALIBAN 6035, by contrast, is a direct dub from the soundtrack of the film, as are the respective tracks on FDC 1021; ARISTON AR 12031; ROSETTA RR 1315. I am not familiar with SANDY HOOK S.H. 2098 (Moulé should give us the details), but, if it was produced like many other SANDY HOOK LPs, then I'm sure it's an exact dub of Caliban 6035.

The RCA master (PBS 79181-1) of "My Old Flame", incidentally, was neither recorded, nor transferred from the Paramount source recordings, on April 23, 1934, as Rust and others would like us to believe. The correct data will be in Steven Lasker's or my book, whichever comes out first. (Stratemenn)

DEMS80/1-8 "DESOR63-65", "26Jan63", ITA "Granada TV": There's some confusion concerning the correct date. In DEMS we find the date as 21-22Jan63, in Joe Igo's manuscript as 21Jan63, Moulé claims the date as 26Jan63 (location as Granada TV studios in Walthamstow, London). Stratemann con-firms the date as 26Jan63 (location as London, and telecast date as 26Jan63). Radio Denmark files has the date as 22Feb.

"Duke Ellington and his Orchestra", referred to as "The Story Of Jazz" when telerecorded, was made at the Granda TV Chelsea Studios, London. The recording started 21Jan63 and continued on 22Jan63. Assland was already right about this in tinued on 22Jan63. On 26Jan63 there were twin concerts at Walthamstow Granada, London, which explains the Walthamstow mixup made by our member Moulé.

WGN's "THE BIG BANDS", telefilmed in Chicago:
In the Down Beat of llFeb65 it states that DE&h0, on
12Jan65, telefilmed 2 shows for WGN's "The Big Bands". Are these the same as described in DESOR as July 1965, New York? (Lawrence)

Yes, they are. Date and origin as stated in Down Beat are correct. The selections are obtainable on VHS video tapes, PAL system (see DEMS89/3-3). (Assland)

DEMS90/4-6, Rattenbury, date as 25Feb73: I'm rather puzzeled by the dates given in Ken Ratten-bury's article, where he says that Ellington was in London on 15Feb73. As you will note from the clipping (see page 8), DEGHO were in Halifax, North Dacota, from 13 through 18 Feb, similar ads also in the Halifax Chronicle Herald on 16 & 17 Feb, so there is no doubt of his presence in Canada during (Moody) that week.

I am indebted to member Lois Moody for bringing my attention to the possible discrepancy in stating the recording date was 15Feb73. It does seem from the evidence she has submitted that something is avry. Now, I accepted the date in all good faith as it had been advised to me by letter from the show's executed producer, John Fisher dated 4Sep81. It could have been a typographical error -- perhaps the date should have been as, say, 5Feb73, who knows? Anyway, we must get it right, and I've already written to Harry Stoneham, whose band Duke played with that time, to search in his diaries and account books to find out just what date the recording really took place on. It is so good that people are interested enough to seek out the truths about the great (Rattenbury)

(Late addition): 90/4-6, "The Ellington Soloists (26)". The date of the recording of the "Michael Parkinson Interview" is 5Jan73.

They shot 5 programs, called "The Jazz Ship". they were televised in 1976. I've extracted titles (including time and program numbers perfomed by the Ellington orch.: Satin Doll 7'(1)/ Jeep's Blues 5'(2) / Interv. with Mercer 1'(2) / Warm Valley 1'15"(2)/United Brotherhood 2'40"(3)/Soph.Lady 3'30"(3)/Concerto For Cootie 7'10"(3), wonderful solo by CW /Mood Indigo 8'(4)/I Got It Bad 5'(4), voc. by Anita Moore / "Three Black Kings" (excerpts) 10'(5): a) King Of The Nativity, b) Solomon, c) Martin Luther King.

There was also a 6th program, which rebroadcast highlights from the previous 5, with different remarks by the comment-(Lawrence) ator, Peter Clayton.

- 12 April 1926 Barry Ulanov's "Duke Ellington" p 51 stated that "the band was playing at the Plantation.. But the Plantation wasn't paying off, so, after a delay on the first week's pay and no pay at all the second, the Washingtonians left. They went up to New England to Salem MA. Actual dates?
- 13. April 1926 Storyville 98 p46: "When Tricky joined the band at the Plantation (located at 50th and Broadway). He played there for two weeks -- mostly without pay, he claimed! -- and then went on the obligatory New England summer tour. (Source: Joe Nanton by Inez Cavanaugh,

Metronome)" Actual dates particularly when Tricky joined the band?

- 14.- Fall 1926 Barry Ulanov "Duke Ellington" p54 states that "Shortly after returning from Salem, in 1926, the band got an offer to go into the Flamingo Club. This was an engagement that ended after three nights! They then went back to the Kentucky Club. What were those three nights?
- 15 1926/27 Storyville 80 p51 "Through the Winter 1926 to Summer 1927 the band was advertised at the Kentucky Club and the Lincoln Theatre as "The 8 Washingtonians". What were the actual dates for these two engagements?
- September 1927 Storyville 80 p53 states that Ellsworth Reynolds reports a 3-week engagement in a Club Ciro revue this month. Actual dates?
- 17- October 1927 Storyville 80 p53 :"(Ellsworth) Reynolds notes an engagement at the Plantation Cafe in a Leonard Harper revue, playing music by Maceo Pinkard . Who's Who of Jazz, John Chilton 1972 states that the band played in the show "Messin' Around", which may have been the Harper revue title, at the Plantation Cafe. Actual dates?

Out of the 615 months I am attempting to cover I have, at this point of time, 204 months that contain one or more queries. The 17 ones, so far, are some of them.



DISCUSSIONS - ADDITIONS CORRECTIONS

DEMS90/4-3: CLUB CAPRICE is indeed the correct name. However the date should be 2Nov39. Club Caprice is the name of the night club found in the Coronado Hotel in St. Louis. This is the historic "stand" when Jimmy Blanton joined the band. Adverts from St.Louis papers confirm this. For years I also believed this to be a 1940 b'cst. Then Jack Towers observed that "Ben Webster is not in the reed section". Broadcast material is from acetates recorded by Jerry Shirley, which were then acquired by Timme Rosenkrantz when he bought Jerry's record cutter, when Jerry went into the (Valburn) service.

TIMNER BOOK correction: From the 1940 Hotel Sherman stand he shows a bc starting with "Swinging At The Seance". the 1940 Hotel Sherman He then follows with Clementine / A Flower Is A Lovesome Thing. "Clementine" & "Flower" are from a west coast bc. The correct info for Hotel Sherman bc is as follows: Sittin' At The Seance / Looking For You Yesterday / Weely. "Looking" The Seance / Looking For You Yesterday / Weely. "Looking" has a wonderful Webster solo and "Weely" is all Rex. This is

Titles are uninteresting from an Ellington view, since Du-(DEMS) ke is not present.

CSP(US) P-16769 "DUKE ELLINGTON" (LP): I recently received a copy of this LP not analyzed in our Bulletin. This Columbia Special Products LP was manufactured for Christopher & Karen Cox, and contains live material taken from AFRS transcriptions "DATE WITH THE DUKE" 4 & 34. This material has since then (this LP was published in 1982) been re-issued on Jerry Valburn's DETS-4 & -15, but Jerry's series reproduces the broadcasts, whereas the CSP LP has the actual transcriptions. It starts with "A Train" from 400 Restaurant (as told by the announcer), and carries on with recordings made at the Adams Theatre, in Newark, on 5May45. I have been unable to identify this "A Train", al-5May45. though I have checked this version against the published versions in my collection. Then, at the end of the transcription, "Carnegie Blues" is longer than versions issued on DETS-4, and contains announcement 'This is the Armed Forces Radio Service' as a conclusion. All the same, the last track on side 2, "Emancipation Celebration", is a repeat of the same title preceding "Don't Get Around ...", and contains the same final announcement as on "Carnegie Blues". that CSP issue is not without interest since the contents is slightly different from what later was issued on DETS. Side 1: (origin unkn.) A Train/5May45 Blutopia/Senti-

mental Journey/Passion Flower/Air Conditioned Jungle/Frantic Fantasy/ Side 2: Main Stem/Everything But You/Carnegie Blues (Mashfield On The Atlantic (state?)) 21Jul45 Emacipation Celebration / Don't Get Around .../ Emancipation Celebration (not mentioned on sleeve or label) (Moulé)

It seems you are not familiar with the AFRS "DATE WITH THE DUKE" 16" transcriptions, which consists of spoken and musical out-takes from the TREASURY DEPT. series of 1945-46 broadcasts. There were 79 transcriptions in all. For DWD-5 you may see DEMS87/2-7+8, for DWD-34 see DEMS87/4-10; 88/4-7 (Aasland's unpublished DE 1945 manuscript).

The state requested for Mashfield On The Atlantic is Massa-(DEMS) chusetts.

It's interesting to consider that those transcriptions were issued on the very official COLUMBIA label (or at least on its subsidiary label CSP). I wonder if such material was ever released on that label? (Moulé)

(Wallén) Radiola 1031: Contents? This LP release contains the 1945 "New Year's Dancing Party" broadcast. One DE selection is included, "Let The Zoomers Drool", which emanates from the "Treasury Show" Evansville on 16Jun45 (see DEMS87/2-9). Consequently you can find this selection also on DETS-10, as well as on a few more selections.

25Aug45: There are two selections with DE and Tommy-Dorsey. What are the name of the tunes? Released on what LP? (I have DETS-20).

Sorry, but you are wrong about the date. The correct date is 14May45 (DETS-20 has nothing to do with this). Tunes are "Tonight I Shall Sleep" (TD guesting with the DE orchestra), and "Minor Goes Muggin!" (DE guesting the TD orchestra). See DEMS86/2-10, and for LP releases see DEMS87/2-7. (Aasland)

DEMS90/4-7, ELLINGTON-NAT COLE-SARAH VAUGHAN: The correct title of this 1951 tour package (put together by the Moe Gale agency) was THE BIGGEST SHOW OF 1951.

The troupe also included Marie Bryant (of "Jump For Joy", and the film, "Jammin' The Blues"; and stage acts such as Stump & Stumpy, Patterson & Jackson, Peg Leg Bates, Timmie Rogers.

Their tour started out with three days at the Boston Garden, Boston, Mass., beginning Sept. 21, then played consecutive nights in Worcester, Mass., Providence, R.I., Troy, N.Y., Newark, N.J., New York (Carnegie Hall) etc. The last date I have for the tour is Nov. 28, when they played Memorial Hall in Columbus, Ohio.

In its review of this performance, Variety (5.12.51p53) stated that this was going to be the next-to-last date of the tour, whereas in an October issue it had said that the units were booked solidly until Dec. 5 when it will close in the

Thus, any information on whatever happened to the troupe after Nov. 28 (Stratemann) would be most welcome. (ctd. p.6)

DEMS90/4-3, 13Nov48 Carnegie Hall Concert: Many thanks for the info. We have just completed CD mastering on this for a 2CD release (VJC 1024/25). Some specifics: Both Jack and I are positive of the sequencing for concerning DE's performance on this occasion: the 2nd half since we worked directly from the line-feed 1) I understand it was recorded. Has this been issued in its acetates recorded by Columbia records. In regard to the first half we believe everything to be correct on the sequencing 2) Was SUITE THURSDAY given its first public performance on BUT are not certain on the positioning for "Paradise"

It picks up right after the long piano intro (2%/pass2DE, in DESOR) and ends just before Betty Roché's vocal (after 3%(half)6BAND, in DESOR). A bit of mu-(Moulé) sic is then repeated under Bernstein's comments.

The CORNELL DATE 1948

DEMS80/2-4, 88/3-6(DESOR 448-1 lp), 89/1-9(picture of CORNELL 1p), 90/4-3(left column): Gordon Ewing, during his work on "The DE Chronicle", he received from one Mr. Art Pilkington two clipping from the "Cornell Daily Sun" 10 & 11 Dec '48. From these we now understand that the second Duke appearance really took place on 10Dec48 (and not as stated on the Cornell LP, where the date is given as 17Nov48 - this remains a mystery). The first Cornell appearance took place on 19Apr47, as we all know. Already on 11Dec48 the 10Dec48 concert was reviewed in the "Cornell Daily Sun" by one Mr. Balliet. Gordon has located Mr. Balliett, now in New York, for possible additional details from the occasion. Thus the correct date, I think MUST be as 10Dec48, and for the sake of interest here are details as from my 1948 ledger concerning the concert in question, based on pieces of information from a great variety of sources.
