

The Smithsonian Institution is preparing some interesting and provocative programs for the summer months in which I know the Ellingtonians will be eager to participate. More about this later.


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Later, in fact, for everybody. Stay by the phone for later developments in everything about the music that we love.


Short Memo to the Constituency,

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


